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Valley Nazis Stir Concern of Veterans, Civic Groups

Organizations in Area Pledge to Fight Hate

How far should a democratic society go in tolerating hatemongers and organized groups bent on the destruction of liberty?

That is the question confronting a number of San Gabriel Valley veterans organizations, clubs and officials in cities where intolerant groups have focused their hate campaigns.

Concerned over the activities of the American Nazi Party in the Valley, the West Covina Elks Club recently co-sponsored with the La Puente Veterans of Foreign Wars a public meeting protesting the party's activities.

Represented were such West Covina organizations as the Elks, Lions, Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Jewish War Veterans, Disabled American Veterans, American Veterans, Womens' Club, Emblem Club and Catholic War Veterans. Also the Lions Clubs in Anaheim and Alhambra have lent support. Others include the Covina Methodist Women's Society, Covina Chamber of Commerce, Glendora Elks and the VFW in La Puente.

The image of a little man with a mustache on a Munich street corner in 1923 still haunts veterans who fought a long war to correct his evils.

And despite the fact that the American Nazi Party apparently has few members in the Valley, the protest movement started with the memory that Hitler originally had only a few followers but within 15 years became the dictator of the German nation.

National Problem

In Glendale the American Nazi Party has attempted under its self-styled West Coast fuehrer, Ralph Forbes, to set up a headquarters. City Manager Eugene Perkins has had first hand experience with the Nazis. They derisively "crowned" him "King Gene the First."

Perkins told the West Covina meeting he was pleased to discuss "the Nazi problem" because "it is not just a Glendale problem or a California problem, it is a national problem."

Geoffrey M. Markell, loyal knight of West Covina Elks Lodge No. 1996, which has spearheaded a protest movement against the Nazis, is chairman of "The Civic Minded Patriotic Citizens."

This group, according to Markell, is made up of citizens, service clubs, veterans clubs, and fraternal organizations from throughout the San Gabriel Valley.

Markell's group was formed after the Nazis stepped up picketing campaigns in Los Angeles and Glendale and served notice that they also would become active in West Covina.

Legal Knots

Markell says the Nazi problem has been tossed into the lap of local organizations because of the apparent inability of county or state government agencies to act.

He particularly referred to a report by County Counsel Harold Kennedy to the Board of Supervisors in which he pointed out that the U.S. Supreme Court decisions "have sharply curtailed the effectiveness of government's efforts to protect itself...."

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The report also noted that "Congress already has occupied the legislative field as regards the controlling of subversive activities directed against the United States, while the State of California in its turn has preempted this field to the exclusion of the county and municipalities."
